Until we elect persons from our own communities and others committed to empowering us, we will continue to see these incidences of institutional racism against Asian and Pacific Islander.

#### For: Empowerment

- Develop a new U.S. foreign policy through the Jackson doctrine:
  - 1) Respect international law;
  - 2) Support self-determination and human rights; and
  - 3) Provide economic development as the alternative to third world tensions.
- Reduce the deficit by raising taxes on big business, and cutting the Pentagon's budget and negotiating nuclear weapons reductions without weakening our defense.

- Raise the minimum wage to a livable income.
- Create jobs by investing public pension funds in housing construction, rebuilding roads and bridges, and cleaning up the environment.
- Enact the Equal Rights Amendment.
- Double federal spending for education.
