HIROSHIMA and NAGASAKI

At 8:15 a.m., August 6, 1945, three American B-29 planes flew over Hiroshima. One of them dropped a single atomic bomb. At about 1,800 feet above ground the bomb exploded. A deafening blast raised the ground temperature to 3000 degrees centigrade, pushed the air pressure up to eight tons a square yard. A wind of fire swept across the city. The fireball was half a mile wide. It was a vast sea of flames from ten a.m. to 2 p.m.. By ten a.m. the next day the flames had become localized, but it kept burning for a week. Over 200,000 people died, more continued to die in the weeks, months and years after the bomb from radiation effects of this first Uranium bomb. This was a "small" bomb, estimated at 12,500 tons of TNT.


At 11:02 a.m., August 9, 1945, three American B-29 planes flew over Nagasaki. One of them dropped a single atomic bomb. At about 1,500 feet above ground the bomb exploded. This was an "improved" bomb using Plutonium. It had larger explosive power than the Uranium bomb used in Hiroshima.

The people of both cities experienced a white, blinding flash, waves of searing heat, a deafening roar, the undulating mush-room cloud which produced a radioactive black rain, and fire storms. People's clothes were burned off, their skin burned and peeled off their bodies and hung in shreds. Initially, the people were at a loss as to what had caused such terrible injuries, and massive death; for radiation burns and illness had never been experienced by human beings on a mass scale. Both cities became crematoriums.

Today, there are enough nuclear arms to destroy the world's four billion people many, many times over. In this Atomic Age, we need to destroy the danger of destruction. We need to act now for Disarmament!

Nuclear Arms Today

- Today, 1982, a single bomb can carry up to one million tons of high explosive and radioactive material.
