A CHALLENGING OFFORTUNITY

The Asian Center has two serious shortcomings.

The deficiencies are: Lack of people involvement and insufficient funds.

Both are urgently required if the Center; s current emphasis on oubreach - to provide extension services to the City's Asian communities - is to succeed.

One such program is the Saturday afternoon Playgroup. In existence for two months, pre-school age children enjoy four hours of supervised play, arts and crafts, as well as listening to music and stories.

Another undertaking is the justlaunched Food Co-op. This is a practical method to fight rising food costs. It will also provide a service to the people who relate to the Center and for others who wish to participate in the Food Co-op.

In the near future, Referral Services will be established. This program will be geared primarily for the Asian elderly and Asian nationals. Areas of concern are: health, income maintenance, legal problems, and education.

Again - the foregoing activities need the involvement of a larger number of people, sufficient funds to implement these efforts.

Help the Center to overcome its shortcomings.

Our prices are slightly above wholesale and in a small way will help fight rising food costs. Our range of items and quantities will be increased with demand. Eventually we hope to stock most staple Asian bottled, canned and dries goods. At present we have:
