Americans of Japanese ancestry during World War 2. In 1992, the 50 Year Remembrance will commemorate this tragic experience through a year-long series of programs and events in order to ensure that the basic democratic and civil rights of any group of people will never be violated in such ways again.

These events will "anchor" the commemoration. In addition, other community events can also be associated with the 50 Year Remembrance project.



The 50 Year Remembrance begins with the annual "Day of Remembrance" program. Accordingly, we are planning a series of events and activities in order to commemorate this historical occasion. With the passage of federal legislation redressing governmental injustices and granting reparations to survivors of the internment camps, the Japanese American community is at an important crossroad. While we have gained a greater understanding of the views and experiences of the internees, revealed flaws in governmental processes and have gained a better understanding of the dynamics of racism, it is equally important that we pass the knowledge gained through our history in America on to future generations. If we do not, we are in danger of forgetting both the pain of a community imprisoned by its own government, as well as the pride of a community united in the fight for redress.

The next "Day of Remembrance" will be an eventfilled weekend in February of 1992 that will draw upon the importance of the past and future on the present day Japanese American community. Event programs include:

ivil Rights Conference March 7, 1992

"Lessons for the Future: The Civil Rights Implications of the World War II Internment Experience for the Next 50 Years," a major civil rights conference cosponsored by the UCLA Asian American Studies Center and the Los Angeles Community Coalition to Commemorate the 50 Year Remembrance: Japanese American Internment. It will focus on major constitutional issues which were raised by the incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II, as well as the lessons that ought to be learned from the event to provide insights into our present and future conditions as a civilized society. Grand Opening Spring, 1992

The Japanese American National Museum will culminate seven years of fundraising, artifacts gathering and national coalition-building with its Grand Opening on April 30, 1992, at its permanent site in the heart of Los Angeles' Little Tokyo. The Museum will hold a Gala Dinner Celebration on Saturday, May 2, 1992.

In commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Japanese American Internment, the Museum, in partnership with UCLA's Wight Art Gallery and the UCLA Asian American Studies Center, will produce a traveling Camp Art Exhibit. The exhibit, which will feature various types of artwork produced by camp internees about their incarceration, is scheduled to premiere on Sunday, October 11, 1992, at the Wight Art Gallery.
