

OUR PHILOSOPHY

The well-being, if not ultimately the survival, of our city and the planet is severely threatened. Clean water, fresh air and access to nutritious food, decent housing and social services are simply not available to a growing number of people. The Learning Alliance attempts to integrate these issues and provide a perspective on the imbalances that is thorough and holistic, looking critically not just at the current manifestations, but at the roots and future implications of these problems. It is from this critical analysis and our active participation that a reconstructive plan for action can be created.

The traditional approach of government, and many organizations and social service agencies, has been to isolate problems rather than to see the links between them. This "band-aid" approach to problem-solving has resulted in a diffusion of resources and human energy, and, on occasion, temporary relief from the suffering, but in many cases it has contributed to the aggravation of the problem. We believe that it is essential to move beyond this approach to seek and develop connections between the many issues and possible solutions.

It is our intention to offer the appropriate information, tools, skills and support to individuals, groups and communities so that together we can better cope with these immense problems and work toward the development of sustainable and just communities. To do this in New York City is a massive task; on a planetary scale it is far greater. This process must begin with people in their communities. We need to educate ourselves and our communities so that we can take the initiative. Through education and direct action, a dynamic of meaningful and constructive change can be created.
